- 5. What would a reasonable response looked like?
- 6. Why does Cain say the punishment is too great?
- 7. Would it be a sin to be angry at Cain if you were in this family?
- 8. Does Cain deserve to die? Why does God promise to take a sevenfold response against someone who carries out 'justice'?
- 9. Why did Cain leave the presence of the Lord?
- 10. What could prevent you from remaining in the Lord's presence?
- 11. How can we be aware of our anger?
- 12. Should we *never* be angry? Support your answer.
- 13. If you have become angry without reason, have you sinned? When has anger become sin?
- 14. If you are successful in being aware of your angry moments, practically speaking, how will you be able to hear God reasoning with you? (James 1:19-21)
